As announced at the end of the consultation, the negotiations will reconvene on Tuesday, 9 September. This Informal Consultation will be co-chaired by H.E. Mr. Andrej Logar, Permanent Representative of Slovenia, and H.E. Ms. Marjon Kamara, Permanent Representative of Liberia. The venue for this Informal Consultation will subsequently be communicated in the Journal of the United Nations.

I look forward to the active participation of your Excellency’s delegation in this next round of negotiations on the Outcome Document.

The General Assembly

Adopts the following outcome document:

**Outcome document of the High-level Meeting of the
General Assembly: The World Conference on indigenous peoples**

1. We, the Heads of State and Government, Ministers and representatives of Member States, reaffirming our solemn commitment to the purposes and principles of the United Nations Charter, in a spirit of cooperation with the indigenous peoples of the world are assembled at United Nations Headquarters in New York on 22 and 23 September 2014, on the occasion of the World Conference on indigenous peoples, to reiterate the important and continuing role of the United Nations in promoting and protecting the rights of Indigenous peoples.
2. We welcome the indigenous peoples' preparatory processes for the World Conference including the Global Indigenous Preparatory Conference for the World Conference on indigenous peoples held in Alta, Norway, in June 2013. We take note of the outcome document of the Alta Conference¹ and other contributions made by indigenous peoples. We also welcome the inclusive preparatory process for this High-level Plenary meeting, including the comprehensive engagement of the representatives of indigenous peoples.
3. We reaffirm our support for the United Nations Declaration on the Rights of indigenous peoples and its commitments to consult and cooperate in good faith with indigenous peoples concerned through their own representative institutions in order to obtain their free, prior and informed consent, prior to the approval of any project affecting their lands, territories and resources or before adopting and implementing legislative or administrative measures that may affect them.
4. We reaffirm our solemn commitment to respect, promote and advance and in no way diminish the rights of indigenous peoples, and to promote the principles of

the United Nations Declaration on the Rights of indigenous peoples adopted by the General Assembly on 13 September 2007².

5. In addition to the Declaration, we recall the other major achievements of the past two decades in building an international framework for the advancement of the rights and aspirations of the world's indigenous peoples, including the establishment of the Permanent Forum on Indigenous Issues, the creation of an Expert Mechanism on the Rights of indigenous peoples, and the appointment of a Special Rapporteur on the Rights of indigenous peoples. [We commit to follow up on [consider in good faith] recommendations and advice issued by these bodies in cooperation with indigenous peoples.]

6. We encourage those states that have not yet ratified or acceded to the International Labour Organization Indigenous and Tribal Peoples Convention, 1989 (no. 169), to consider doing so; we recall the obligation under the Convention, of ratifying States to develop coordinated and systematic action to protect the rights of indigenous peoples³.

7. We commit to take relevant legislative, policy and administrative measures to achieve the goals of the United Nations Declaration on the Rights of indigenous peoples and to promote awareness of it among all sectors of society, especially Members of Parliament, the judiciary and the civil service.

8. We commit to cooperate with indigenous peoples, through their own representative institutions, to prepare and implement national action plans and strategies and other measures where relevant, devoted to the implementation of the United Nations Declaration on the Rights of indigenous peoples.

9. We commit to promote and protect the rights of indigenous persons with disabilities and to continue to improve their social and economic conditions, including by developing targeted measures for national action plans and strategies in collaboration with indigenous persons with disabilities. We will ensure that national legislative, policy and institutional structures related to indigenous peoples are inclusive of indigenous persons with disabilities, and contribute to the advancement of their rights.

10. We commit to work with indigenous peoples to disaggregate data as appropriate, or conduct surveys and to utilise culturally sensitive indicators of indigenous peoples' well-being to address the situation and needs of indigenous peoples and individuals, particularly elders, women, youth, children and persons with disabilities.

11. We commit to ensure equal access to, and empower indigenous peoples to deliver as far as possible, high-quality and culturally adequate education, health, housing, water, sanitation and other economic and social programmes to improve their well-being, through the provision of adequate resources.

12. We commit to ensure that indigenous peoples and individuals enjoy the highest attainable standard of physical and mental health. We shall improve access to sexual and reproductive health and rights and reduce rates of HIV and AIDS, malaria, tuberculosis and non-communicable diseases, by increasing resources and focusing

on prevention. We also respect indigenous peoples' traditional health practices and medicines.

13. We support the empowerment and capacity-building of Indigenous youth, including their full and effective participation in decision making processes in matters that affect them. We commit to develop, in consultation with indigenous peoples, policies, programmes and resources targeted at the well-being of indigenous youth particularly in the areas of health, education, employment and the transmission of traditional knowledge, languages and practices, and to take measures to promote awareness and understanding of their rights.

14. We acknowledge that indigenous peoples' justice institutions can play a positive role in providing access to justice, dispute resolution and contribute to harmonious relationships within indigenous peoples' communities and within society, consistent with international human rights norms, standards and principles as well as national legislation. We commit to coordinate and conduct dialogue with indigenous peoples' justice institutions where such institutions exist.

15. We commit to support the empowerment of indigenous women and to formulate and implement, in collaboration with indigenous peoples, particularly indigenous women and their organizations, policies and programmes designed to promote capacity-building and strengthen their leadership. We support measures which will facilitate the full and effective participation of indigenous women in decision making processes at all levels and in all areas, and eliminate barriers for their participation in political, economic, social and cultural life.

16. We commit to intensify our efforts, in cooperation with indigenous peoples, to prevent and eliminate all forms of violence and discrimination against indigenous peoples and individuals, in particular, women, children, youth, older persons and persons with disabilities, by strengthening legal, policy and institutional frameworks.

17. We commit to establish at the national level, in conjunction with indigenous peoples concerned, fair, independent, impartial, open and transparent processes to acknowledge, advance and adjudicate the rights of indigenous peoples pertaining to lands, territories and resources. Such processes will be culturally appropriate and flexible, and competent to safeguard free, prior and informed consent by indigenous peoples prior to development or use of lands, territories and resources.

18. We commit to consult and cooperate with indigenous peoples to address the impact or potential impact of major development projects, including extractive industries and to ensure that indigenous peoples participate in the benefits from such projects. The rights of indigenous peoples regarding development of lands, territories and resources, will be incorporated into law, policies and practice.

19. We commit to develop, in conjunction with indigenous peoples concerned, and where appropriate, policies, programmes and resources to support indigenous peoples' occupations, traditional subsistence activities, economies, livelihoods, food security and nutrition.

20. We affirm and recognize the importance of indigenous peoples' religious and cultural sites as set out in the United Nations Declaration on the Rights of indigenous peoples and call upon all States to provide access to and repatriation of their ceremonial objects and human remains. We commit to develop, in conjunction with indigenous peoples concerned fair, transparent and effective mechanisms for access to and repatriation of ceremonial objects and human remains at national and international levels.

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21. [We urge Member States to address the impact of militarization of indigenous peoples' lands and territories, unless military activity is justified by a relevant public interest.] Where military activities exist in the lands or territories of indigenous peoples, we urge Member States to immediately commence effective consultations with the indigenous peoples concerned. All parties [to armed conflict] should seek to protect civilian populations, including indigenous peoples, from the effects of conflict.

22. We invite the United Nations Human Rights Council in consultation with indigenous peoples, to recommend to the 71st session of the General Assembly on options to use, modify and improve existing United Nations mechanisms to more effectively promote respect for and implementation of the United Nations Declaration on the Rights of indigenous peoples. In this process, the Council may review the role of the Expert Mechanism on the Rights of indigenous peoples to better assist Member States to monitor, evaluate and improve implementation of the Declaration.

23. We invite Human Rights Treaty bodies to consider the United Nations Declaration on the Rights of indigenous peoples in accordance with their existing mandates. We encourage Member States to include, as appropriate information on the situation on the rights of indigenous peoples, including the measures taken to pursue the objectives of the United Nations Declaration on the Rights of indigenous peoples in reports to Human Rights Treaty bodies, and in the Universal Periodic Review.

24. We welcome the increasingly important role of national human rights institutions⁴, as well as regional human rights institutions in contributing to the achievement of the goals of the Declaration on the Rights of indigenous peoples. We encourage the private sector, civil society, and academia to take an active role in promoting and protecting the rights of indigenous peoples.

25. We request the Secretary-General, in consultation and cooperation with indigenous peoples and Member States, to develop a System-wide Action Plan within existing resources, to ensure a coherent approach to the full realization of the provisions of United Nations Declaration on the Rights of indigenous peoples.

26. We invite the Secretary General, in light of the need for increased awareness of the rights of indigenous peoples, to give consideration to the appointment of a United Nations official at the highest possible level.

27. We invite the Human Rights Council to consider examining the causes and consequences of violence against indigenous women and girls, in consultation with the Special Rapporteur on Violence Against Women, the Special Rapporteur on the Rights of indigenous peoples and other Special Procedures within their respective mandates. We also invite the Economic and Social Council to recommend to the Commission on the Status of Women "the empowerment of indigenous women" as a theme at a future session.

28. Building on the report of the Secretary-General on ways and means of promoting participation at the United Nations of indigenous peoples' representatives on the issues affecting them⁵, we request the Secretary-General, taking into account

views expressed by indigenous peoples, to present concrete proposals to the 70th Session of the General Assembly in this regard.

[29. We invite the Economic and Social Council to organize a high-level panel discussion in conjunction with indigenous peoples, during its Coordination and Management meetings to review the policies and procedures on indigenous peoples within ECOSOC subsidiary bodies.]

30. We commit to respect the contributions of indigenous peoples to ecosystem management and sustainable development. This includes knowledge generated through experience in hunting, gathering, fishing, pastoralism and agriculture, as well as their sciences, technologies and cultures.

[31. We confirm that indigenous peoples' knowledge and strategies to sustain their environment will be respected and utilized when we develop national and international policies, standards and measures on climate change mitigation and adaptation.]

32. We commit to give due consideration to the rights of indigenous peoples, including the right to development⁶ in the process of elaborating the post-2015 development agenda and to mainstream the promotion and protection of their cultures and rights into the development agenda at the national, regional and international levels.

33. We invite Member States and actively encourage the private sector, and other institutions to contribute to the United Nations Voluntary Fund for indigenous peoples, the United Nations Trust Fund on Indigenous Issues, IFAD indigenous peoples Assistance Facility, and the United Nations indigenous peoples Partnership as a means of promoting the rights of indigenous peoples worldwide.

[34. We request the Secretary-General to include a specific focus on indigenous peoples in the final report⁷ on the achievement of the millennium development goals.]

35. We request the Secretary-General, in coordination with relevant United Nations system entities, to report on progress to the 71st session of the General Assembly and make recommendations, as appropriate, for further concrete steps to implement this outcome document.

Annex I

Additional proposed paragraphs

4bis. We recognize that the situation of indigenous peoples varies from region to region and from country to country and that the significance of national and regional particularities and various historical and cultural backgrounds should be taken into consideration. 29 bis. We request that the ECOSOC reform and strengthen the Permanent Forum on Indigenous Issues in order to make it more effective. In this sense, it is requested that its name be modified to “Permanent Forum for Indigenous Peoples”. In accordance with the principle of representation, the numbers of members should be increased to 20 members, with two places reserved for the representatives of indigenous peoples in the 3 most populous sociocultural regions and one place reserved for the representatives of the other regions.
