

Pointers delivered by the Delegation of Indonesia at the Panel Discussion on the role of the Regional Mechanism in advancing the Indigenous People.

1. We thank and appreciate all speakers for their presentations. In particular we take note the statement from the Special Rapporteur emphasizing that the UNDRIP should be considered as a remedial instrument for "healing and reconciliations".
2. We share that particular view from the SR. We consider that the discussion with regard to the UNDRIP should not be considered "in a vacuum". The UNDRIP should be seen as a whole and in a comprehensive manners. We note that the participants of the EMRIP meetings rarely make a reference to the Article 46 or UNDRIP. We consider that Article 46 as an important element because it gives clear recognition that anything under UNDRIP should not contravene the UN Charter, in particular connected to the issue of territorial integrity, political unity and sovereignty of any states. This is the important element that was becoming a uniting factor for all member states of the United Nations during the adoption of the Declaration. We would like to seek SR's view in this regard.

We also believe that the problems for most countries with regard to the implementation of the declaration, as well as their obligations in protecting human rights of their population, are the issue of capability and not the lack of political will. In this regard, the aspect of international cooperation should be given appropriate attention. Therefore, the international cooperation connected to the issue of lesson learned among UN Member states should always be promoted.
4. We would also like to seek SR's view on the on-going discussion on the Post-2015 Development Agenda. As we aware, the High-Level Panel of the Post-2015 Development Agenda, chaired by the President of Indonesia, Prime Minister of UK and President of Liberia, had submitted their report to the UNSG on May 2013. The report, containing a vision for an eradication of poverty by 2030, suggested several transformative shift that are very relevant to the our discussion, i.e.: (1) leave no one behind; (2) the importance of the sustainable development ; and (3) the creation of a new global partnership that will bring all actors (including the civil society) in the global efforts for the international development. In this regard, we would like to seek SR's view on this particular issue.
5. Lastly, we would like to commend the work of the AICHR, represented today by Mr Rafendi Djamin, for their efforts in promoting and protecting Human Rights in the region. Our Government stands ready to continue working together with AICHR in advancing the issue of HR promotion and protection in the region.
