EXPLANATION OF VOTE OF THE DELEGATION OF THE PHILIPPINES

1st Session of the Human Rights Council Geneva, 29 June 2006

Mr. President,

-almost a decagle ago,

The Philippine Government is fully committed to safeguarding and upholding the rights of its indigenous peoples. Because of this commitment, the Philippine Government has already enacted a national Indigenous People's Rights Act and has two autonomous regions in the country.

We commend the Working Group Chair, Mr. Chavez for his work.

We are empathize with the concerns of representatives of indigenous peoples' and their desire that the Human Rights Council forward to the General Assembly at this session the draft UN Declaration on the Rights of Indigenous Peoples. But we believe that the latest text of the draft declaration merits more time for study.

The Philippine delegation abstained on the resolution because we want to be sure that the current draft of the declaration is fully compatible with our Constitution and national laws, so that it can be implemented in a meaningful and helicite manner. The Philippine Government, while favorably disposed to the substance of the declaration of a Mole, wishes for more time to study the new term and provide an opportunity for concerned national agencies — those which would eventually oversee the implementation of the

declaration – to discuss the language of key provisions and their implications.
