Statement on behalf of the Second World Indigenous Youth Conference

Madam Chairman,
Members of the Working Group,

Indigenous elders, brothers and sisters:

Watchiya (Greetings - Cree)
Tihei Mauri Ora (I express my essence - Maori)
Pingaarutilimmik Nalunaarutissaqarpugut (We have something
important to express - Greenlandic Inuktitut)
Arranda Aknarra (A new circle - Arranda)
Taintragual dew (of Unity has been formed - Mapudungun)

Madam Chairman,

What has just been said is of special significance to Indigenous youth. It is symbolic of the New Era that young Indigenous peoples have entered. It is a combination of five different Indigenous languages, which communicates one thing: "A new circle of unity has been formed among Indigenous youth"

My name is Jorgen Waever Johansen, I am an Inuit from Kalaallit Nunaat, commonly known as Greenland. I have been given the honour to speak on behalf of the 2000 Indigenous youth from several hundred Indigenous nations, represented at the 2nd World Indigenous Youth Conference, which was held from 5th to the 11th of July in Darwin, Australia.

The theme of the Conference was "Claiming Our Future". As a gathering, organised BY Indigenous Youth FOR Indigenous Youth, the Conference was a positive expression of our self-determination.

At this point, Madam Chairman, I would like to express our deepest and sincere gratitude to the organisers of the Conference, and the Larrakia nation of Darwin for allowing us to meet on their land. I would also like to express our feelings of unity with the Peoples who were unable to attend the Conference, and regret they could not join us.

We give thanks to the Cree Nation Youth Council, who set the foundations of this Youth Movement at the 1st World Indigenous Youth Conference in Quebec City, Canada in 1992.

Madam Chairman, the following statements, that I will read, are some of the views and demands as expressed by young Indigenous Peoples represented at the Conference.

We, Indigenous youth recognise self-determination is a right which cannot be **given**. It is a right which is **exercised**, to increase self-respect and therefore respect among Indigenous peoples.

As our sister from the Australian youth expressed, young people are the leaders of the future. Our elders, leaders, and Governments must recognise our demand for greater participation in decision making processes. We must be

involved in these consultations, as decisions made today will affect us as youth tomorrow.

Madam Chairman, Indigenous Youth demand that nation states honour and comply with treaties deemed acceptable by Indigenous Peoples, where these treaties exist.

We as youth demand the annulment of treaties and other forms of land rights agreements negotiated in ambiguity.

Where treaties do not exist, we demand that nation states take immediate action to negotiate just and permanent agreements with our Peoples. Indigenous Peoples reserve the right to decide whether or not we will negotiate.

Madam Chairman, on the issues of culture and education, we as youth must have the freedom to learn our true histories. We make a call to our elders to open the way for us to learn about our heritage: to help us reclaim our past so we may claim our future.

We demand the right to reclaim and revive our languages. Moreover, we demand the right to speak our languages without fear of discrimination.

Indigenous Youth recognise women form the backbone of our cultural identity. Indigenous womens' issues must be recognised as human rights issues, requiring the full support and participation of men.

Madam Chairman, I would now like to inform you of developments relating to the establishment of an international network of Indigenous youth. Members of this network are sitting with me as I speak. We call on the United Nations, through the Working Group, to recognise and support this network and its activities globally to unite and empower Indigenous youth.

We remind the Working Group of its in principle support for this movement, at its Tenth Session.

We strongly urge the Working Group to repeat its call to other U.N. agencies, and governments to provide the necessary resources to facilitate the establishment of this Indigenous youth initiative.

In conclusion, Madam Chairman, these statements capture the discussion and common views shared at the 2nd World Indigenous Youth Conference. We must continue to revive our cultural heritage for ourselves, to educate non-Indigenous people about our ways of life and exercise our will to survive, because we are the First Nations.
