

Statement made by the Delegation of the Government of the Republic of Mauritius

Madam Chair,

Let me at the outset affirm that my delegation is sympathetic to the cause of genuine indigenous populations and it is our belief that a recognition of their claims to land and landrights would be a major step in their aspiration to their legitimate rights.

The objective of my statement to-day, however, Madam Chair, is to clarify some of the issues raised by the Comité Social des Chagossiens in its previous interventions. Let me state for the record that Members of the Comité Social des Chagossiens are first and foremost citizens of the Republic of Mauritius and derive their status as citizens from the Constitution of Mauritius itself. As such Madam Chairperson, they enjoy all the rights conferred to Mauritian citizens including the right to own movable and immovable property.

It may be useful to recall in this context that the Chagos Archipelago was uninhabited until the latter part of the 19th Century when workers were recruited under contract in mainland Mauritius to work in these islands. Indeed, Madam Chairperson, the statement made by the Hon. Prime Minister of Mauritius at the United Nations General Assembly in September 1998, confirms the displacement of the former inhabitants of the Chagos Archipelago back to Mauritius. In his

statement, the Prime Minister, recalling the sovereignty of Mauritius

over these islands, also reminded Members of the plight of some 1500

inhabitants referred to as " Chagossiens " or « illois » and stressed the

need for the former colonial power to enter into a constructive bilateral

dialogue with the Government of the Republic of Mauritius for the early

and unconditional restoration of the Chagos Archipelago including Diego

Garcia to the sovereignty of Mauritius.

Until this is translated in concrete reality, the Government of

Mauritius will leave no stone unturned since the inhabitants of the

Chagos Archipelago including Diego García are Mauritian citizens. The

Government of Mauritius, as the legal representative of all its citizens,

has already indicated in this context, its willingness to enter into

negotiations with the Government of the United Kingdom for an early

and unconditional return of the Chagos Archipelago including Diego

Garcia to Mauritius.

My delegation requests that our statement be fully reflected in the

Report of this Working Group.
