to the Special Rapporteur. We make this statement of thanks  
knowing that words cannot convey the depth of our gratitude  
for the monumental effort that has been made on this study  
which has great import for our peoples.

Madam Chair, when the U.N. was created a Committee on  
Non-Self-Governing Territories and Decolonization was part of the  
initial structure because states had to recognize that European &  
western colonizers had taken possession of the lands of indigenous  
peoples and were violating the human rights of indigenous peoples  
throughout the world. At that time a list of colonies was created.  
Hawaii was placed on the list. In 1959 Hawaii was removed from  
the list by the unilateral action of the U.S. The indigenous  
peoples of Hawaii were never given the opportunity to decolonize  
our lands or to vote for autonomy or independence - options which  
international law dictated we have, but were denied.

The Special Rapporteur acknowledges this historic  
fact and in the case of Hawaii endorses the Reinstatement of  
Hawaii on the U.N. List of Non-Self-Governing Territories. We  
know that this recommendation will be difficult to implement  
but we are committed to this undertaking regardless of the cost,  
time or personal sacrifice it will entail on our part. We  
must pursue every and every opportunity we have to achieve our
