I agree that the documents must be sent back and I also agree that it is undesirable, in doing so, to describe their source as a "source privée". We have, of course, to treat it as a source privée because the Six Nations Indians are not recognised by any of the Members of the League as a State or international entity of any kind, but we ought not to put ourselves in the position of appearing to decide by ourselves that it is not a State.

I think perhaps the following note verbale might be sent to Mr. Ockleshaw-Johnson:

> The Secretariat of the League of Nations begs to acknowledge the receipt of Mr. J. R. Ockleshaw-Johnson's letter of February 10th, notifying the dispatch of a box, which has been received, containing printed copies of a document entitled "Tragic Plight of the Six Nations (Iroquois) Indians: Petition for Intervention of the League of Nations and Non-Member States", and requesting that the envelopes containing this document may be handed to the delegates whose names appear thereon.

Under the existing rules and practice, the Secretariat is not authorised to make such a distribution of the document in question, and it is, accordingly, holding the box and its contents to Mr. Ockleshaw-Johnson's disposal and will return is & him of he so regars to.
